

# **Onerow yellowcress**

# Nasturtium microphyllum

# **Description**

It was introduced around the world due to its popularity as a salad green.

### Habit

Erect or spreading; perennial; 4-18 in tall; emergent aquatic, sometimes evergreen; forming large, tangled masses; stems spreading, rooting from the lower nodes.

#### Leaves

Pinnately-divided, 3-9 rounded leaflets with the end one longest.


### **Stems**

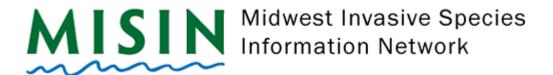
Erect; 4-18 in tall.

#### **Flowers**

White in color, 4 petals, 1/5 in wide, petals are 2 times longer than the sepals, inflorescence is a cluster (raceme) of stalked flowers from the ends of the shoots.

## **Fruits and Seeds**





Seed pod, long, thin, coarse seeds in 1 row, uniseriate, reddish brown, ovoid.

#### Habitat

Native to Europe, North Africa, and Asia. Found in lake margins, streams, ponds, springs, river shores, seeps, swales, wet meadows.

# Reproduction

By seed.

#### Similar

Watercress (Nasturtium officinale).

### **Monitoring and Rapid Response**

Hand-pulling; effectively controlled by any of the several readily available general use herbicides such as glyphosate.
