# True forget-me-not

Myosotis scorpioides

# Description

Many legends regarding this plant in European folklore. Plant was first recognized in 1532.

### Habit

Erect; perennial; 4-24 in tall forb; stems hairy; often creeping; roots fibrous.

### Leaves

Alternate, stalkless, hairy, evergreen in ponds.

### Stems

Hairy; erect.

### Flowers

Blue with a yellow center, 5-parted, 1/4-3/8 in wide, petals flat at the top of the tube, calyx with flat, tight hairs, the lobes much shorter than the tube; calyx drawing inflorescence a terminal, curving, branched cluster (cyme); blooms May to September.

# **Fruits and Seeds**

Smooth, shiny nutlets (4) on spreading stalks,

# blackish in color.

# Habitat

Native to Eurasia. Found in moist to wet meadows, ditches, pond margins and swamps.

# Reproduction

By seed or vegetatively by stolons.

# Similar

Woodland forget-me-not (Myosotis sylvatica).

Hand-pulling for small infestations.
