# Sickleweed

Falcaria vulgaris

Description

#### Habit

Perennial forb, erect, deep taproot and reaching a height of 1-2 ft. tall.

#### Leaves

Alternate, simple (basal leaves), mostly pinnate with 3-5 segments, leathery, leaf edges serrated with sickle-shaped leaflets, toothed margins; lower leaves have petiole, upper leaves sessile.

#### Stems

Erect, grooved, branched and solid; growing up to 1-2 ft. tall.

#### Flowers

Compound umbel, 2-4 in. wide, small, white in color, 5 separated petals; blooms from June to August.

#### **Fruits and Seeds**

Achene, yellowish-brown, oblong, glabrous,

slightly compressed, 2-5 mm. long.

# Habitat

Native to Eurasia. Found in riverbanks, forest clearings, dry grasslands, waste places, roadsides, ditches, fallow land, and meadows.

## Reproduction

By seed and vegetatively via root fragments.

## Similar

Queen Anne's lace (Daucus carota).
